

School Environmental Safety Incident Reporting (SESIR)

- SESIR grew out of concern that children be safe in school. SESIR enables schools to track and analyze patterns of violent, criminal or disruptive activity.
- The intent is for there to be complete and objective data from which to design interventions to improve the learning environment.
- School-level data are sent to the district in a standardized format; the district sends data to the Department where it is compiled into an annual report.



SESIR Basics

- Developed 1995 for school staff
- Based on criminal code
- 26 incident categories reported, plus 4 "non-incident" categories
- Each incident may have related elements: alcohol, bullying, drug, gang, hate-crime, hazing, injury, vaping or weapon




SESIR Incidents

- On school grounds, school transportation, or at off-campus school sponsored events
- The most serious offense (reported as Incident, Type) is the primary SESIR incident. Secondary offenses can be reported as one or more "related elements".
- 365 days/24 hours
- Student, Non-Student, Out-of-District Student, School Personnel or Unknown Offenders



SESIR Reporting

- SESIR incidents are reported <u>per incident</u>. Report only ONE incident even when there are multiple students involved in the same incident.
- Discipline actions are <u>per student</u>.



The school principal must develop a plan to verify the accuracy of reported incidents.
1001.54(3), F.S. Duties of school principals.	Each school principal must make the necessary provisions to ensure that all school reports are accurate and timely, and must provide the necessary training opportunities for staff to accurately report attendance, FTE program participation, student performance, teacher appraisal, and school safety and discipline data.

Dozens of witnesses (expert and otherwise), terabytes of documents and data, months of testimony, and incalculable numbers of questions have occupied our time in the preceding months, and we believe our conclusions to be both well-founded and reliably-sourced. Concealing the fact of the existence of negative and/or criminal behavior, whether as an inadvertent consequence of misguided policies or as a direct result of intentional malfeasance has, unfortunately, become a disturbing pattern in Florida's schools in more recent years. We have referenced this lamentable fact in prior reports, and make a fuller explication of it here. We believe this behavior to be a festering blight on our state's schools, and we sincerely hope that the sunlight of public condemnation will serve as at least a partial disinfectant.
