What is an LEA?



A Local Education Agency (LEA) is a public authority, often a school district or an equivalent entity, that provides services to or administers public elementary or secondary schools within a specific geographic region. LEAs are responsible for overseeing public education within a specific geographic area, ensuring compliance with state and federal education laws, and managing local public schools' funding, curriculum, and administration. They typically have their own governing boards and can include various types of educational institutions such as elementary, middle, and high schools.



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A Local Education Agency (LEA) is a public authority, often a school district or an equivalent entity, that operates local public primary and secondary schools in the United States. LEAs are responsible for overseeing public education within a specific geographic area, ensuring compliance with state and federal education laws, and managing local public schools' funding, curriculum, and administration. They typically have their own governing boards or councils and can include various types of educational institutions such as elementary, middle, and high schools.

Drafting a Letter

What Goes In the Letter?

- ★ The letter should clearly state the intent to become an LEA.
- ★ Include information about the school or district, such as its name, address, and contact information.
- ★ Provide a rationale for seeking LEA status and outline the capacity to fulfill LEA responsibilities.





Drafting a Letter

Where do I send the Letter?

Address the letter to the appropriate division within the Florida Charter School Office.
Attention should be noted to the Charter Schools Director.



Exceptional Student Education



Serving ESE Students



Local education agencies (LEA) must ensure that:

- ★ A free appropriate public education (FAPE) is made available to all students with disabilities; and
- To the maximum extent appropriate, students with disabilities are educated with their nondisable peers (i.e., in the least restrictive environment (LRE).







A student's individual educational plan (IEP) team identifies:

- ★ Annual goals designed to meet the student's needs resulting from the disability (academic, behavioral, functional);
- ★ ESE services and supports necessary for the student to achieve the annual goals
- ★ The most appropriate LRE based on the student's unique needs and circumstances



Continuum of Placements




A continuum of alternative placements must be available to meet the needs of its students with disabilities. Placements include:

- ★ All ESE services provided in the regular educational setting
- ★ Student removed from the regular setting for some or all ESE services (e.g., ESE resource room for math; counseling; speech therapy)
- ★ Majority of the day in the ESE classroom (e.g., self-contained or separate class)



ESE Services and Supports





LEA Obligations

Ensure there is a multi-tiered system of supports MTSS), including general education interventions for struggling students (academic, behavioral)

Provide for evaluations of students who may have a disability under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) or Section 504, or be gifted under State Board Rules, and determine eligibility

Develop and implement IEPs or Section 504 Plans for students with disabilities and education plans (EPs) for gifted students

Implement hospital/homebound program for eligible students



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
